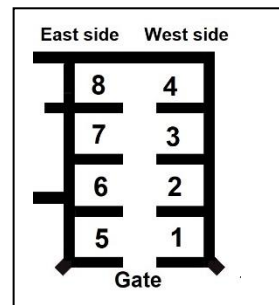


GRANGE CATACOMB INTERMENTS

Five of the eight bays in the **West catacombs** large end chamber have interments, identified below by transcribing the inscription from each memorial slab sealing the loculus/niche. These are the **only** interments within the Grange Cemetery catacombs. Positions relate to **bay numbers** in the City of Edinburgh Council records (see diagram) and the **loculus position within a bay** when looking directly at the tiers. Where date of birth is not part of the inscription this has been added when easily sourced [].

Biographical Information First and Second Lords Dunfermline

THE RIGHT HONOURABLE JAMES ABERCROMBY, FIRST BARON DUNFERMLINE, 1776-1858

He was a British barrister and Whig politician and served as Speaker of the House of Commons 1835–1839. He attended the Royal High School, Edinburgh and studied at Christchurch Oxford. He was called to the English Bar at Lincoln's Inn in 1801, became a commissioner of bankruptcy and was later appointed steward of the Duke of Devonshire's estates.

He sat as Whig Member of Parliament for Midhurst 1807–1812 and for Calne 1812–1830. In 1827 he was sworn of the Privy Council and appointed Judge-Advocate-General, a post he held until 1828. In 1830 he was made Lord Chief Baron of the Court of Exchequer in Scotland, a position he retained until 1832, when the office was abolished. In 1832 he returned to the House of Commons as one of two members for Edinburgh. In July 1834 he entered Lord Melbourne's cabinet as Master of the Mint but held the post only until November of the same year, when the Whigs lost power.

The Dictionary of National Biography writes that "As speaker Abercromby acted with great impartiality while he possessed sufficient decision to quell any serious tendency to disorder." On his retirement he was raised to the peerage as Baron Dunfermline, of Dunfermline in the County of Fife.

After his retirement Abercromby continued to take an interest in public affairs, specifically those involving the city of Edinburgh. He was one of the originators of the United Industrial School for the support and training of destitute children. In 1841 he was elected as Dean of Faculty at the University of Glasgow. He also wrote a biography of his father Sir Ralph Abercromby (1734-1801), published posthumously in 1861. Sir Ralph who rose to the rank of lieutenant-general in the British Army, was appointed Governor of Trinidad, served as Commander-in-Chief, Ireland, and was noted for his services during the French Revolutionary Wars.

RALPH ABERCROMBY, SECOND LORD DUNFERMLINE KCB FRSE, 1803-1868

Son of James Abercromby, 1st Baron Dunfermline [see above], and Lady Mary Anne (Marianne), first daughter of Egerton Leigh, of High Leigh, Cheshire. He was educated at Eton and Peterhouse, Cambridge, before entering the Diplomatic Service in 1821, becoming an attaché at Frankfurt in 1821 and a précis writer in the Foreign Office in 1827. He was Secretary of Legation at Berlin 1831 to 1835. In 1838 he married Lady Mary Elizabeth (Gilbert) Elliot-Murray-Kynynmound, daughter of the Earl of Minto. From 1838 to 1840 he was Minister to the German Confederation, from 1840 to 1851 Minister at Turin, and from 1851 to 1858 Minister at The Hague. He was awarded the KCB in 1851. Upon his father's death in 1858 he succeeded to the Barony, and lived at the family home Colinton House, Edinburgh. In 1863 he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Edinburgh. He died without a male heir, and the Barony became extinct.

ARCHIBALD ABERCROMBY TROTTER, ADVOCATE. EDINBURGH, 1878 – 1925

Formerly Archibald MacGregor Trotter. Son of Colonel John Moubray Trotter of Colinton House. He was called to the Bar in 1904 but never practised as an advocate. His mother was Mary Catherine Elizabeth Abercromby, daughter of Ralph Abercromby, 2nd Baron Dunfermline and Lady Mary Elizabeth Elliot-Murray-Kynynmound. She was born 1849 and married Colonel John Moubray Trotter, son of Archibald Trotter on 27 October 1876.
